The above-named are being held in incommunicado detention since being arrested on 7 March 1999 in Nsok Nsomo, a town in eastern Equatorial Guinea. Amnesty International fears for their safety since torture and ill-treatment in detention is routine in the country.

All were acting as election monitors for their respective political parties, the *Unión Popular* (UP), Popular Union and the *Convergencia para la Democracia Social* (CPDS), Convergence for Social Democracy during legislative elections that day, which have now concluded.

The election process was deeply flawed with people in some cases being beaten if they refused to vote for the ruling *Partido Democrático de Guinea Ecuatorial* (PDGE), Equatorial Guinea Democratic Party. In addition, some opposition supporters were prevented from voting at all while some supporters of the ruling party were able to vote twice. Other opposition party election monitors were also expelled from polling stations by force.

In the run-up to the elections too, at least 10 opposition candidates, including a number of CPDS party leaders, were briefly detained and there was much obstruction to their pre-election campaigning activities with candidates being prevented from attending electoral rallies by being either expelled from towns or confined to their villages.

BACKGROUND

The latest elections were the second legislative elections to be held in the country since 1992 when a multi-party political system was introduced.
