Amnesty International has now learned that the case of **Koigi wa Wamwere** and the five others charged with him has been combined with the case of the nine new names given above. All fifteen are due to be tried on 14 December 1993. They have all been charged with two counts of armed robbery (section 297.2 of the Penal Code), possession of firearms without a certificate and possession of ammunition without a certificate.

Ephran Muchiri Muhoro has suffered a ruptured bladder and a fractured leg, reportedly resulting from torture by the police. He has received hospital treatment but was unable to stand in court on 8 December. **Stefan Kariuki Muigai** has also received medical treatment for injuries reportedly sustained from police torture.

Amnesty International has received reliable reports that **Jackson Mutonye Ndegwa** was in fact arrested on 1 November 1993 at 6pm, shortly after he arrived in Nakuru from Nairobi and his body taken to the mortuary on 3 November with two bullet wounds to the head. This contradicts police reports that he was shot in the leg during the raid on Bahati police station on 2 November, and he died two days later while in police custody. Amnesty International is calling for

an independent and impartial inquiry into his death. The organization has expressed concern in the past at deaths in police custody.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters either in English or in your own language:

- calling for an independent investigation into the torture of Ephran Muchiri Muhoro and Stefan Kariuki Muigai and seeking public assurances of humane treatment of those still held;
- calling for medical treatment to be provided for those detainees who have reportedly sustained injuries while in police custody;
- expressing concern that Koigi wa Wamwere and the other prisoners may be prisoners of conscience and stating that AI will be watching the judicial proceedings very closely in view of the pattern of unfair political trials of peaceful government opponents and doubts about their alleged involvement in the raid on Bahati Police Post;
- expressing concern that if found guilty they would face the death penalty; calling for an independent and impartial inquiry into the death of Jackson Mutonye Ndegwa.
