Raymond Maake and Ebison Makgo Pasha appeared before Nelspruit Regional Court on 2 August 1990 and were charged with possession of explosives. They are still in custody in Nelspruit awaiting trial. On 2 August they were able to consult their legal representative for the first time after being arrested on 3 February 1990 and spending six months in incommunicado detention, with no access to visits from relatives or their lawyer.

Agnes Khebile and Michael Mkhabela are still detained under section 29 of the Internal Security Act. They were arrested at Sidlamafa township near Malelane in the Eastern Transvaal on 12 April 1990. As far as Amnesty International is aware, there has still been no official confirmation of their detention or of where they are being held, though they are believed to be held in Nelspruit prison where there are separate sections for men and for women.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters:

- expressing concern that Agnes Khebile and Michael Mkhabela are apparently still detained incommunicado under section 29 of the Internal Security Act; asking for confirmation of their detention and of where they are currently held;
- seeking assurances that they will not be subjected to torture or ill-treatment while in security detention;
- urging that they be granted immediate access to legal counsel, to visits from relatives, and to independent medical advice;
- calling for them to be released from detention without further delay if they are not to be charged promptly with a recognizably criminal offence;
- requesting that Raymond Maake and Ebison Makgo Phasha be allowed access to a medical doctor of their choice, in view of their lengthy incommunicado detention.
