Fear of torture / Fear for safety / Prisoners of conscience

TOGONADJOMBE Antoine Koffi, human rights defender

Amnesty International is concerned for the safety of Nadjombe Antoine Koffi, a Togolese Amnesty International member, arrested on 14 May 1999 in the capital, Lomé. He is being held at the *Sûreté Nationale* (National Security Service) of Lomé, where he is at risk of torture.

Amnesty International considers Nadjombe Antoine Koffi to be a prisoner of conscience detained solely because of his human rights work for Amnesty International. His arrest is linked to an Amnesty International report, published in May, accusing the Togolese government of allowing the security forces to carry out grave human rights violations with impunity before, during and after the elections in 1998. His wife was arrested with him but released two days later.

Human rights defenders Tengue Nestor and Gayibor François were arrested by police, together with Sant'Anna Brice, in Lomé, on 3 May 1999, also in connection with the Amnesty International report. (See UA 58/99, AFR 57/04/99, 7 May 1999.) They remain in detention. Amnesty International considers all three to be prisoners of conscience.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

For years there has been a constant stream of reports of human rights violations in Togo. Extrajudicial executions and "disappearances" are carried out with total impunity in the country, ruled since 1967 by President Gnassingbé Eyadéma. Arbitrary arrests are followed by torture and ill-treatment, sometimes resulting in deaths in custody. These violations are largely attributable to the security forces who have acted for years without being accountable to the law.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/faxes/express/airmail letters in French or your own language:

expressing concern for the safety of Nadjombe Antoine Kofi, and urging the authorities to ensure that he is not tortured or ill-treated in custody;
expressing concern that he is being detained solely because of his human rights work and as such that you consider him to be a prisoner of conscience;
calling on the Togolese authorities to release him immediately and unconditionally.
