@Journalism, a Dangerous Profession: Physical Attacks, Death Threats and Harassment of Journalists in Argentina

In the early hours of 30 August 1993 a firebomb exploded at the Radio station "La Tribu FM", a low-power community radio station in the neighbourhood of Almagro in Buenos Aires. There were no casualties but the resulting fire destroyed the entrance and windows of the station. No group or individual has claimed responsibility for the attack. Before the attack La Tribu FM radio station had been broadcasting information on juveniles' rights and campaigning against police edicts that are considered unconstitutional.

This was not an isolated incident. During the second half of 1993 there was a resurgence of violence against journalists in Argentina. In the recent past, hundreds of journalists and other press workers were assassinated or "disappeared" during the years of military rule. After the country's return to democracy, attacks, threats and other forms of intimidation against journalists continued to be reported (see Amnesty International: Attacks, Threats and Other Forms of Intimidation Against Journalists, Judges and Government Critics, AI Index AMR 13/06/91, August 1991). The Buenos Aires Press Workers' Union, Unión de Trabajadores de Prensa de Buenos Aires (UTPBA), claims that between March 1990 and August 1993 over 150 journalists received anonymous death threats or have been subjected to different forms of harassment.

Attacks and threats to journalists increased in 1993, particularly in the months leading to the October parliamentary elections. Between March and September 1993 the Argentine Press Workers Federation, <u>Federación Argentina de Trabajadores de la Prensa</u> (FATPREN), submitted to the Minister of the Interior a list of 105 incidents of threats and violence against journalists.

Among those attacked or harassed was journalist **Marcelo Bonelli**, radio commentator and columnist of the newspaper <u>Clarín</u>. He was beaten up by two unidentified men on 21 July on his way to a radio station in the Federal capital. On 6 August radio and television presenters **Magdalena Ruíz Guiñazú** and **Mónica Cahen D' Anvers** received anonymous death threats against their grandchildren, and **Graciela Guadalupe**, journalist of the daily <u>La Nación</u>, received death threats against her son. All the attacks were denounced to the authorities but to Amnesty International's knowledge nobody has been brought to justice for these incidents.

On 14 August seven journalists, among them photographer **Daniel Rodríguez** from the newspaper <u>Clarín</u>, were beaten up while President Menem was addressing the Rural Association, <u>Sociedad Rural</u> farm fair. The journalists were covering an incident, in which a member of the public who heckled President Menem during his speech was forcibly thrown out of the main stand, when they were attacked by a gang who shouted slogans in favour of the president. Three of the attackers were detained overnight in the local police station where a high ranking government officer reportedly sought to intervene on their behalf.

Following the attack on the journalists on 14 August, **Hernán López Echague**, a reporter of the Buenos Aires daily <u>Página 12</u>, published a number of journalistic articles exposing the links between the attackers of <u>La Rural</u> and political gangs loyal to leading members of the ruling Peronist party in the Province of Buenos Aires. In one of the most worrying examples of violence against members of the press, on 25 August, three days after the publication of the articles, Hernán López Echague was violently attacked by two unidentified men who were awaiting at the entrance of his home in Buenos Aires. The assailants hit Hernán López Echague over the head and slashed his face with a flick-knife while swearing at him.

Two men suspected of having been involved in the attack on the journalist were arrested on 30 August. After an identification parade, where Hernán López Echague failed to recognize his assailants among the individuals lined up, the two detainees were released for lack of evidence (falta de méritos).

Following this attack President Carlos Menem issued a statement deploring the incident and denied any government links, indicating that he had instructed the minister of the Interior Mr. Carlos Ruckhauf to conduct a thorough inquiry.

In September Hernán López Echague was subjected to a second attack. According to reports, in the early hours of the morning of 8 September, two unidentified men attacked Hernán López Echague in the streets of Avellaneda, Buenos Aires Province. He was hit over the head and forced into a car by three men while leaving a Bingo Hall where he was researching for a book. Allegedly, inside the vehicle the men continued hitting him with a blunt instrument and warned him that next time they would kill him ("La próxima vez te vamos a matar en serio"). After a short drive Hernán López Echague was dumped on a side street by his assailants.

Over the same period a number of journalists both in the federal capital Buenos Aires and in the provinces were also subjected to death threats and other forms of intimidation. Three days after the attack on journalists at the <u>Sociedad Rural</u> on 14 August, **Gladys Mondino**, journalist of the Radio Station <u>FM Espacial</u> in the neighbourhood of Ciudad Evita, locality of La Matanza, Buenos Aires Province, was warned in an anonymous telephone call to "stop pestering with your comments otherwise you will be brought down with bullets",

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("diganle a Mondino que se deje de joder con los comentarios, si no la vamos a bajar a balazos"). A complaint regarding the threat was filed at the local 9th Police station.

Some of the threats against journalists were apparently linked with the attack on López Echague. On 27 August the TV presenter (TELEFE) Laly Covas was assaulted. Reportedly, Laly Covas was interviewing Hernán López Echague outside his house when a corpulent man grabbed her by the scruff of the neck. The man tried to run away but was stopped by other journalists and subsequently arrested. It has been reported that he has a police record on petty crimes (prontuario policial por delitos menores).

On 26 August an anonymous phone caller reportedly told **Alberto Carlos Vila Ortiz**, the editor of the newspaper <u>La Capital</u>, from Rosario, Santa Fé province, that "besides yourself other journalists are sentenced to death because of their opposition toward the government" ("además de vos, están condenados a muerte otros periodistas por su posición frente al gobierno"). The caller reportedly named eight other journalists in his threat. Information published in the Argentine press stated that the Secretary of the Press Union, Edgardo Carmona reported that a few days earlier an anonymous call was received at the press Union asking for Alberto Carlos Vila Ortiz to be informed that he would be killed if he did not leave the newspaper.

On 27 August the Secretary General of the Buenos Aires Press Workers Union <u>Unión de Trabajadores de Prensa de Buenos Aires</u> (UTPBA), **Juan Carlos Camaño**, denounced having received several telephone threats in the early hours of 26 August. On the same day it was reported that **Jorge Jacobson**, radio journalist of <u>Radio Continental</u> was left a message in his answering machine by a group identifying itself as "Evita Capitana de Villa Las Ranas", stating that "it is going to happen like it happened to your

friend, but for him we have only slashed his face, for you we will hack your head ("te va a pasar como a tu amigo, pero a ese solamente le cortamos la cara, a vos te vamos a cortar la cabeza").

On 28 August the Argentine press informed that two journalists had reportedly received telephone death threats. A colleague of **Jorge Alonso** and **Diego Tonellier**, general editor and political editor respectively of the daily <u>La Nación</u>, was told by an anonymous caller to inform the two journalists to "stop pestering otherwise we'll make everybody fly" ("que se dejen de joder o les vamos a poner un aparatito que va a volar a todos").

On 30 August the Argentine Press Workers Federation, <u>Federación Argentina de</u> Trabajadores de Prensa (FATPREN), reported the attacks to the authorities and held them

responsible. They also stated that freedom of expression and the safety of journalists is in great danger in Argentina.

On 9 September the journalist of <u>Clarin</u>, **Daniel Santoro**, denounced to the 16th Police Station the death threats he had received through an anonymous telephone call and in a letter enclosing a dagger allegedly sent by an unknown arab group. Daniel Santoro had been conducting an assignment on investigative journalism related to possible collaboration between Argentina and Iraq in the construction of an Iraqi missile based on the Argentine made Cóndor II missile.

Because of the escalation of threats on journalists, the UTPBA called for a symbolic stoppage of half an hour and a demonstration opposite the presidential house on 10 September.

On 10 September President Menem appointed a special prosecutor, (<u>procurador fiscal especial</u>), to investigate the attacks against journalists. However, on 16 September, the President was quoted in the press as claiming that the attacks against journalists was "an occupational hazard", ("<u>son gajes del oficio</u>") and compared it to the killing of tourists in Miami. During a public speech in the Province of Santa Fé, in the same month, President Carlos Menem denied any links between his party and the threats. Members of his administration have also stated that it was a campaign to damage the government's image because of parliamentary elections scheduled for Sunday 3 October 1993.

Attacks and harassment of journalists continued after the 3 October parliamentary election. On 28 October at least five journalists were reportedly beaten by the police while covering a public demonstration. Among those beaten were cameramen **Alberto Albo** and **Hugo Fazio**, assistant cameraman **Miguel García** and TV reporters **Sandra Jacobson** and **Claudio Pérez**. According to reports, the incident arose when the police used force to disperse a march by pensioners trying to reach the National Congress.

When the march approached Congress, anti-riot police on foot charged against journalists and demonstrators while police drove their motorbikes against the crowd. In addition to the journalists, dozens of pensioners as well as 15 police officers were reportedly injured in the incident, although none of them seriously.

President Menem was reported as stating that while he was not seeking to justify the police action, he wanted to point out that the police had been insulted, spat at and had eggs thrown at them by the demonstrators. The President blamed the incident on agitators who had infiltrated the demonstration. The President also advised journalists not to get involved into brawls (grescas) and to be more than prudent (que actúen con la prudencia más que necesaria). The Minister of the Interior, Carlos Ruckauf, while also claiming that agitators infiltrated the march, condemned the police reaction. He pledged that an inquiry on the

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incident would be opened and announced that three police officers were being suspended from duty pending the outcome of the inquiry.

On 11 November journalist **Mario Bonino**, who worked in the press office of the Buenos Aires Press Workers' Union, <u>Unión de Trabajadores de Prensa de Buenos Aires</u> (UTPBA), disappeared after leaving his home on his way to work. On 15 November his body was found in the waters of the Riachuelo river, in the suburbs of Buenos Aires. His death has been classified by the judge conducting the inquiry as "death in suspicious circumstances" ("<u>muerte dudosa</u>"). Forensic reports indicate that Mario Bonino was dead before falling into the waters of the Riachuelo river which suggests a possible murder. Although there is no evidence that Mario Bonino's death was related to his journalistic work in UTPBA, or that the authorities have any responsibility for his death, Amnesty International is concerned that it happened in the context of an ongoing campaign of threats and intimidation against journalists.

In the early hours of Sunday 14 November three unidentified people forced open the door of the headquarters of the UTPBA and beat up the nightwatchman with an iron bar. Later in the morning an anonymous woman telephone caller warned the union that "what happened to them in the previous night may happen again", ("lo que les pasó anoche les puede volver a pasar"). The nightwatchman was reportedly admitted to hospital for treatment of his wounds.

Amnesty International has welcomed information provided in late September 1993 by the Argentine Embassy in London, indicating that President Carlos Menem had nominated the Alternate Attorney General Luis González Warcalde as Special attorney to carry out the relevant investigations on the attacks of journalists and to ensure that those found responsible be brought to justice.

Although it is reported that investigations have been initiated on the first attack against Hernán López Echague and, according to reports, some of the journalists threatened have been offered protection by the authorities, Amnesty International is deeply concerned at the pattern of intimidation by unidentified people on members of the press allegedly for their investigative journalism or criticism of the government. Amnesty International believes that the authorities have the duty to ensure freedom of expression by thoroughly investigating all denunciations of threats and harassment against journalists, bringing to justice the perpetrators and effectively guaranteeing the protection of journalists and their families.
