MEDICAL LETTER WRITING ACTION III-health Filiz Gülkokuer Turkey

Key words ill-health / insufficient medical care

Summary

Amnesty International is concerned at reports that Filiz Gülkokuer is seriously ill in Gebze prison, western Turkey, and is not receiving adequate medical care. Filiz Gülkokuer has been suffering from an inherited disorder of haemaglobin, thalassaemia major, since childhood. She was imprisoned in 1995 and sentenced to 18 years in prison in 1999 after having been convicted of holding a position of leadership within the Union of Revolutionary Communists in Turkey (TIKB), an illegal organization in Turkey.

Recommended actions

Please write letters of appeal,

- expressing concern at reports that Filiz Gülkokuer is seriously ill in Gebze Prison;
- asking for information on the current state of health of Filiz Gülkokuer and for details of whatever medical care she is currently receiving;
- urging that she receives whatever medical care she requires without delays and on a regular basis as specified by her doctors;
- call for the gendarmerie to be instructed to remain out of the hearing and sight of the patient while care is given, in order to secure the privacy of Filiz Gülkokuer and the confidentiality of the doctor-patient relationship;
- call upon the Turkish government to implement as a matter of urgency the recommendations with regard to health care in places of detention made by the European Committee for the Prevention of Torture and Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment following its visit to Turkey in October 1997.

If you receive no reply from the government or other recipients within two months of dispatch of your letter, please send a follow up letter seeking a response. Please check with the medical team if you are sending appeals after 10 January, and send copies of any replies you do receive to the International Secretariat (att: medical team).

MEDICAL CONCERN

Ill-health Filiz Gülkokuer Turkey

Amnesty International is concerned at reports that Filiz Gülkokuer is seriously ill in Gebze prison, western Turkey, and is not receiving adequate medical care. Filiz Gülkokuer has been suffering from an inherited disorder of haemaglobin, thalassaemia major, since childhood. Filiz Gülkokuer was imprisoned in 1995 and sentenced to 18 years in prison in 1999 after having been convicted of holding a position of leadership within the Union of Revolutionary Communists in Turkey (TIKB), an illegal organization in Turkey.

Background information

Filiz Gülkokuer, a journalist, was sentenced early in 1999 to 18 years in prison under Article 168/1 of the Turkish Penal Code for having a position of leadership (*örgüt yöneticilik*) within an illegal armed opposition group. The sentence is currently under review with the Appeal Court.

Amnesty International has received reports that Filiz Gülkokuer was tortured by police during interrogation, and that her conviction was based on statements made by others under torture but retracted in court. The organization has not been able to confirm these reports independently but believes them to be consistent with similar cases in Turkey.

Prison health care

Medical care in Turkish prisons is generally inadequate as prison infirmaries are materially under-resourced and there are not enough qualified medical personnel. Filiz Gülkokuer's hospital visits have been frequently delayed according to Amnesty International's information. Although the prison administration has given permission for her to be taken to hospital, the gendarmerie commander has placed arbitrary limitations on the number of prisoners to be taken to the hospital at any one time and thereby has prevented some of the sick prisoners from receiving adequate treatment. According to reports received by Amnesty International, on occasions when Filiz Gülkokuer was taken to hospital, either her handcuffs were not removed during examinations or the gendarmes refused to leave the examination room during the examination.
