UA 363/97 Fear of ill-treatment / Medical concern /
Possible prisoners of conscience 20 November 1997

At least some of 31 people detained recently in Yemen are alleged to have been subjected to beatings and ill-treatment in custody. Amnesty International is concerned that they remain at risk of ill-treatment and that they may not have access to medical treatment in Mukalla prison where they are currently believed to be held. One of the detainees is reported to have been transferred to hospital as a result of the ill-treatment.

The 31 detainees were arrested between 10 and 13 November 1997 in Hadhramout province, mostly in al-Mukalla city. The arrests began when opposition political party leaders in the province, particularly those of the Yemeni Socialist Party (YSP), the League of the Sons of Yemen (LSY), and independent politicians, began to mobilize campaigns against a government proposal to divide Hadhramout into two provinces. The proposal is currently being studied by parliament. The leading campaigners were arrested on 10 and 11 November while the rest were arrested on 13 November during a demonstration in al-Mukalla. All but two of the arrests are said to have been carried out without judicial warrant.

The detainees are believed to have been held incommunicado until 18 November when they were allowed access to family and lawyers for the first time. They were reported to have been subjected to beatings with sticks. Reports indicate that Hussein Sa'id al-Muhammad, a member of LSY, suffered internal bleeding as a result and was transferred to hospital where he underwent an operation.

The detainees may be prisoners of conscience, held solely for the peaceful expression of their opposition to government policies. It is reported that they neither used nor advocated violence during their protest campaigns.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in English, Arabic or your own language:

- calling for a prompt independent investigation into the alleged beatings of the detainees, and for anyone found responsible for ill-treatment to be brought to justice;
- seeking assurances that the detainees are now being treated humanely and given regular access to lawyers and family, and to any medical attention they may require;
- calling for the immediate and unconditional release of all those detained if they are being held solely for peaceful protests against the government proposal to divide Hadhramout. Please add that if they have been charged with recognizably criminal offences, they should be given prompt and fair trials.
