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## Afghanistan ten years on: Hopes and fears

To mark the ten years since the US-led military intervention in Afghanistan began on 7 October, Amnesty International is examining the promises of 2001 against the achievements of 2011, assessing the progress and failure in human rights in Afghanistan over the past decade.

Ten years on, the Afghan government and its international partners are forging ahead with reconciliation with the Taleban and transition of security to the Afghan forces.

Horia has been victimised for her work as a human rights defender, and is a survivor of human rights abuses experienced while living in Afghanistan.
