Amnesty International puts spotlight on torture worldwide

To mark the International Day in Support of Victims of Torture on 26 June, Amnesty International will lead worldwide events and publish reports putting a spotlight on torture and other ill-treatment. It will lead attempts to roll back the assault on the prohibition of torture, in particular the arguments that it is justified or necessary to counter the threat of terrorism.

Amnesty International is calling on governments to: **condemn** all forms of torture and other ill-treatment and complicity in such abuse; work to **prevent** torture through ending secret and incommunicado detention; and **hold to account** those responsible through thorough investigations and prosecutions.

Events and in-depth reports will highlight Amnesty International's concerns over the continued use and justification of torture and other ill-treatment under the guise of international and national security in the context of counter terrorism. Focus will be on Tunisia, US actions at Guantánamo and in secret CIA detention, and the role that European governments have played in 'renditions' and secret detentions.

Highly visual events with filming and photo opportunities will take place in locations around the world, including in Brussels, Belgium; Copenhagen, Denmark; Dublin, Ireland; Quezon City, Philippines; various cities across Spain, Montevideo, Uruguay; and Washington DC, USA.

"Torture and other ill-treatment take place under conditions of secrecy, hidden away from the outside world. On 26 June we will be shining a spotlight on torture, the world must act to reverse the worrying trend of recent years and eradicate this barbaric practice," said Amnesty International.

Key events include:

23 June: Publication of a major new report revealing the serious human rights violations – including torture and enforced disappearance – that are being committed in connection with the Tunisian government's security and counter-terrorism policies.

24 June: Publication of a report revealing the disturbing extent of European states' involvement in US renditions and secret detention ranging from active participation to tacit collusion, and the shocking lack of action to ensure accountability for these human rights violations.

25 June: In **Washington D.C.**, members and other activists will gather on the National Mall to publicly open an exact replica of a Guantánamo cell that journalists and members of the public can enter. Al will be calling on Congress and the Bush administration to shut down Guantánamo.

In Brussels: Public event in front of the European Parliament -- a press conference will be organised around a "Euro-truck" featuring a mock-up of the European flag with actors painted in blue portraying a scene of abduction, blending into the flag. MEPs will sign a giant postcard that reads "torture means terror", addressed to Pres. Sarkozy, as France holds the presidency of the EU.
