USA - stay of execution, Georgia. The Georgia Board of Pardons and Paroles stayed the execution of Alexander Williams, convicted for the 1986 rape and murder of Aleta Carol Bunch. Alexander Williams was 17 at the time of the crime and is mentally ill. Authorities in Georgia reportedly have forcibly medicated him to make him competent for execution.
