Cambodia - CAT issues provisional conclusions. The UN Committee against Torture expressed concern, among other things, over numerous, ongoing and consistent allegations of acts of torture and other ill-treatment committed by law-enforcement personnel in police stations and prisons; extended impunity for past and present violations of human rights committed by law-enforcement officials and members of the armed forces, and in particular the failure of the Government to investigate acts of torture and other cruel or degrading treatment; and allegations of widespread corruption among public officials in the criminal justice system.
