Kenya - pathologists receive death threats. Two forensic pathologists, Dr Moses Njue and Dr Andrew Gachie, have reportedly received death threats following documentation of torture. The pathologists carried out an autopsy on the body of Paul Kimani Wambiru who was found dead shortly after his release from Nyeri Police Station, Central Province. They noted evidence of torture in their reports and concluded Paul Wambiru had died as a result of these injuries. Subsequently they were reportedly asked by authorities to change the findings in their autopsy reports. Furthermore, the two pathologists have reportedly received death threats following the post-mortem examination. The source of the threats is unknown. (no link available)

Nigeria - appeal against sentence of death by stoning. On 3 June Amina Awal will appeal against the death sentence imposed on her by a Shari'a court in Katsina state. Amina Awal was convicted of adultery and sentenced to death by stoning on 22 March 2002 (no link available).

USA - interview with human rights investigator. The *Washington Post* (24 May) interviewed Peter Bouckaert, researcher for the emergencies program of Human Rights Watch. Recently he travelled to Jenin refugee camp.
