El Salvador. Thousands of children were innocent victims of the armed conflict in El Salvador between 1980 and 1991. Hundreds were assassinated in massacres committed by the armed forces; others were taken after their parents were murdered or after becoming separated from them during army attacks on their villages. Médecins sans Frontières has expressed concern that a new industrial property law in Guatemala risks ending the organization's capacity to provide anti-retrovirals at 75-99% less than the Government pays for such drugs.
