At least 11 people, including the 10 people named above, are now reported to have been detained in connection with a 4 December attack on a civilian aircraft. They are now reportedly held incommunicado at the *Brigade spéciale de Recherche*, (BSR), a gendarmerie special investigation unit in Bujumbura, with the exception of Madame Sonia, who is held at the headquarters of the *Police Spéciale de Roulage* (PSR), Special Haulage Police, Bujumbura. Torture is routine in both places, and Amnesty International remains concerned for their safety.

The detainees have reportedly been accused of failing to warn the authorities of the imminent attack. The basis for this accusation is not known. At least six of those detained were initially held incommunicado briefly at Gakumba military camp, close to the airport.

The SABENA aircraft was hit by gunfire as it approached Bujumbura airport, but landed safely. The Government of Burundi has attributed the attack to an armed opposition group, the *Forces nationales de libération* (FNL), National Liberation Forces. However, the FNL have denied responsibility, and has accused members of the armed forces of being behind the attack.

## FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in French or in your own language (Please check whether postal services are operating to Burundi from your country):

- calling for immediate steps to be taken to establish the identities of and whereabouts of all those detained, and to protect them from torture and "disappearance";
- calling them to be granted immediate access to humanitarian and human rights organizations, lawyers and their families;
- calling on the authorities to state publically why they were arrested, and to release them immediately if they are not to be charged with a recognizably criminal offence for which there is substantiating evidence.
