Further information on UA 233/98 (AFR 16/21/98, 2 September 1998) - Fear for safety / Fear of ill-treatment

BURUNDIMr Pascal Birari, local administrative advisor (conseilleur communal) in Mutimbuzi commune, Rural Bujumbura province and around 15 others, names unknown

Fears continue for the safety of Pascal Birari, now known to be held in Gatumba police station (*brigade*), in Rural Bujumbura province, and for 15 others for whom no further news has been received.

Pascal Birari is reportedly in urgent need of medical attention as a result of being severely beaten in detention. Amnesty International is concerned that he has so far been denied this medical treatment and that he is at risk of further ill-treatment.

Pascal Birari was arrested on 30 August 1998 by soldiers who reportedly accused him of providing food and other support to armed opposition groups. They claimed that he had been denounced by 15 others arrested five days earlier in Maramvya zone, Rural Bujumbura.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please check with your post office whether postal services from your country are functioning to Burundi. Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes - and, if you are able, express/airmail letters - in French or in your own language:

- expressing deep concern that Pascal Birari has been severely beaten by members of the security forces while in detention at Gatumba brigade;
- urging that Pascal Birari be given urgent medical attention and that immediate steps be taken to protect him from further ill-treatment;
- calling for the whereabouts of the 15 others, reportedly detained at Kiyange military position, to be made public, and seeking assurances that they will not be ill-treated in detention;
- asking that an independent investigation be carried out into the reported ill-treatment of Pascal Birari and that, if confirmed, any official found to have carried out or condoned the ill-treatment be removed from their post and brought to justice;
- reminding the government of Burundi of its commitment to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, in particular Article 5: "No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment".
