Amnesty International is concerned for the safety of the family named above who have been in detention since April 1998. They are reported to have been regularly beaten and ill-treated by the administrator of the commune. In addition to this, conditions of detention in Burundi, including in district cells, are very harsh and often amount to cruel, inhuman and degrading treatment.

The family appears to have been illegally arrested and detained, at the *cachot communal* (district cell) in Isale commune, Rural Bujumbura province, in order to force them to reveal the location of a sum of money supposedly hidden by Pontien Twagirayezu. No family member is known to have been accused of a criminal offence.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

More than 9,000 civilians, mostly Hutu, are held in various prisons and detention centres around the country. Hundreds of these, mainly Hutu, have been arrested and accused of participating in or collaborating with Hutu-dominated armed opposition groups. In many cases there is no substantiating evidence to support the accusation and many of the arrests appear to be arbitrary. The majority are held without charge or trial. Many have been tortured and ill-treated to extract statements or information. There are numerous reports of "disappearances" of detainees, particularly in military camps. Children as young as 12 years old have been arbitrarily accused of collaboration with armed groups and unlawfully detained. Increasingly, individuals appear to be arrested, and often ill-treated, for reasons of extortion.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please check with your post office whether postal services from your country are functioning to Burundi. Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes - and if you are able, express/airmail letters - in French or your own language:

- expressing concern for the safety of the family named above, who are illegally detained at Isale district cell, in Bujumbura Rural, where they are reported to have been regularly beaten and ill-treated;
- calling for their arrest and detention to be immediately investigated and for their physical integrity to be protected;
- calling for the detainees to be immediately and unconditionally released;
- reminding the Government of Burundi of its commitment to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, in particular Article 9:"No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile".
