Diribi Demissie, Gemechu Feyera and Sentayehu Workneh were released on 15 November, on bail of 10,000 birr (US\$1,230) each. The Central Prison authorities had initially refused to release the men, after the Supreme Court rejected a prosecution appeal against the releases, which had been ordered by the High Court.

Other detainees are also applying for release on bail.

Amnesty International considered the three men to be prisoners of conscience. They are the leaders of the long-established Oromo welfare organisation, the Mecha Tulema Association, which the government appears determined to shut down. They deny charges of inciting armed uprising and membership of the armed opposition Oromo Liberation Front (OLF), which have been laid against them and 25 others still detained and applying for provisional release. Those still detained include 22 students (including most of the students named above), Ethiopian Television deputy news editor Dabassa Wakjira, and Nega Kefane Gudata of the Oromo Development Association. Ayelew Itisa, a secretary in the MTA office, has been released on bail.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send appeals to arrive as quickly as possible, in English or your own language:

- welcoming the release on bail of Diribi Demissie, Gemechu Feyera and Sentayehu Workneh, whom Amnesty International considered to be prisoners of conscience:
- asking the authorities to respond swiftly to applications for bail by others facing the same charges, such as Dabassa Wakiira and Nega Kefane Gudata:
- asking for assurances that all will be tried promptly and fairly, in accordance with international standards for fair trial.
