Incommunicado detention/

ETHIOPIA Ziad Hussein Abarusky (m)
Four others (names unknown)

Ziad Hussein Abarusky and four others were arrested at the end of June in Dire Dawa city in Oromia region, eastern Ethiopia. They are being held incommunicado in Memria prison on the outskirts of Dire Dawa.

Ziad Hussein Abarusky has reportedly been subjected to severe torture, including to his sexual organs, that left him unable to walk. He has been refused medical attention. The authorities have not allowed his family to visit him, although his family have been permitted to take food for him to the prison.

All five detainees are employees of the Ethiopia-Djibouti Railway at Dire Dawa. Ziad Hussein Abarusky has been working there for over 15 years. One of the other detainees is a senior official of the railway. They are all ethnic Oromos.

Ziad Hussein Abarusky, a father of seven, is a well-known former Ethiopian national football player, and an assistant coach of the Under-20s national team that participated in the Under 20s World Cup in Argentina in 2001. He is currently the head coach of a premier league football team called Babur in Dire-Dawa.

## BACKGROUND INFORMATION

These arrests follow a bomb attack at the Dire Dawa railway office building on 24 June, for which the Oromo Liberation Front (OLF) claimed responsibility. Though there were no casualties the bomb blast damaged one of the rooms in the building and a train compartment.

The OLF has been fighting government forces in Oromia since it left the Ethiopian government coalition in 1992. Thousands of members of the Oromo ethnic group have been detained without charge or trial for several years on suspicion of involvement with the OLF. There are frequent reports of OLF suspects and anti-government demonstrators being ill-treated or tortured in custody.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send appeals to arrive as quickly as possible, in Amharic, English or in your own language:

- expressing concern for the safety of Ziad Hussein Abarusky and four other detainees, who were arrested in the days following the bomb blast at the Dire Dawa railway station on 24 June;
- calling on the authorities to investigate allegations of torture and ill treatment of Ziad Hussein Abarusky and his fellow detainees;
- calling on the authorities to allow Ziad Hussein Abarusky and the other detainees immediate access to medical treatment and access to an appropriate international humanitarian organization such as the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC);
- calling for the detainees to be granted access to their families and legal representatives;
- urging the authorities to either charge the detainees with a recognizable criminal offence and give them a prompt and fair trial, or release them immediately.
