Eleven of the prisoners were released by the Nakuru magistrate on 28 January 1994, as indicated above, when the Attorney General instructed that the charge against them, robbery with violence, be dropped.

Koigi wa Wamwere and the first three named above remain in custody, with no statement yet from the Attorney General as to whether or not the case will proceed any further. It is due to be mentioned again in court on 11 March 1994.

These four continue to be held in Nakuru Prison where it is reported conditions have improved but are still poor. They are suffering from overcrowding and denial of basic medication. Food is poor and families are not able to bring food in to them.

The magistrate ruled that Charles Kuria Wamwere, who has typhoid and Godfrey Ngengi Njuguna, who has a kidney infection, be admitted to hospital. In

previous cases the police have refused to comply with the magistrate's order about hospital treatment.

There has still been no independent and impartial inquiry into the death in custody of Jackson Mutonye Ndegwa.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters in English or your own language:

- welcoming the unconditional release of the eleven named above;
- expressing concern that Koigi wa Wamwere and the three other remaining prisoners are still held in custody without any decision from the authorities as to whether or not they will be prosecuted, stating that Amnesty International believes they may be prisoners of conscience;
- calling for them to be immediately released if the prosecution is not going to proceed with the charges against them;
- calling for them to receive the necessary medical treatment with hospital admission as ordered by the magistrate.
