Amnesty International is concerned about the safety of Njuguna Njui who was arrested on 22 November 1993 in Nakuru and has been held without charge for 24 days, 10 days beyond the 14 day limit prescribed by Kenyan law.

Kiguru Ng'ang'a is believed to have been released.

Charles Kuria Wamwere and James Maigwa have been charged with robbery with violence in the same case as that of Koigi wa Wamwere. Charles Kuria and James Maigwa are both close relatives of Koigi wa Wamwere. They and twelve others are charged with two counts of armed robbery, possession of a firearm without a certificate and possession of ammunition without a certificate. The trial due to be held in Nakuru Magistrates Court was adjourned on 14 December 1993, at the request of the prosecution. The police file is currently with the Attorney General. The case is due to go for mention on 28 December 1993 when the opinion of the Attorney General will be heard and a new trial date possibly set for early 1994.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters in English or your own language:

- calling for Njuguna Njui to be released without delay if he is not charged with a recognisably criminal offence and expressing concern about his safety given he is now being held beyond the legally permitted limit prescribed by Kenyan law;
- urging the authorities to allow Njuguna Njui immediate access to his family, lawyer and doctors;
- expressing concern that Koigi wa Wamwere, Charles Kuria Wamwere and the other prisoners may be prisoners of conscience and stating that Amnesty International will be watching the judicial proceedings very closely in view of the pattern of unfair political trials of peaceful government opponents and doubts about their alleged involvement in the raid on Bahati Police Post;
- expressing concern that if found guilty they would face the death penalty;
