Amnesty International is concerned that death sentences imposed following recent secret treason trials could be confirmed and carried out in the near future, and has renewed its calls for any death sentences to be commuted by the head of state and no executions carried out.

On 14 July 1995, the Nigerian authorities announced that 40 defendants had been convicted by the Special Military Tribunal and warrants issued for the arrest of three others convicted *in absentia*. The Tribunal's recommendations have been placed before the military government, the Provisional Ruling Council (PRC), for confirmation or disallowal.

No details were provided about who had been convicted, the charges on which they had been convicted or the sentences imposed. The press and public have been excluded from all but the opening session of the first trial of 23 defendants on 5 June 1995.

Conflicting reports from unofficial sources suggest that at least 12 and as many as 15 prisoners may have been sentenced to death including Colonel R.S.B. Bello-Fadile, Lieutenant-Colonel Happy Kefas Bulus and Colonel Lawan Gwadabe - and that 11 other defendants have been sentenced to between 25 years' and life imprisonment. These are said to include former head of state General (Retd) Olusegun Obasanjo and his former deputy, Major-General (Retd) Shehu Musa Yar'Adua, as well as Christine Anyanwu and Ben Charles Obi, opposition newspaper editors.

Other defendants are reported to have received prison sentences of between two and 25 years. Shehu Sanni, Vice-Chairman of the Campaign for Democracy (CD), is reported to have received a seven-year prison term after being convicted of "managing an unlawful society" in a trial in which the prosecution failed to produce any evidence that the Campaign for Democracy was an unlawful organization or that either it or the defendant had engaged in unlawful activities. He was apparently prosecuted because he refused to give evidence against other CD leaders in exchange for his freedom. **Amnesty International considers** him to be a prisoner of conscience, and believes that others among those convicted have also been imprisoned for the non-violent expression of their political views.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The trials before the Special Military Tribunal have been grossly unfair. The tribunal is an arm of the military government rather than a court of law: an officer in the military government chairs the panel of judges who are all armed forces officers, and its decisions and sentences have to be confirmed by the head of state, General Sani Abacha. It denies all crucial rights of defence, including the defendants' rights to see details of the charges against them, to be defended by a lawyer of their own choice, to be able to prepare their defence properly, to be tried in open court, to address the tribunal in their own defence and to appeal against the tribunal's decisions to an independent court of law. There is no legal recourse against the government's confirmation in such cases; the normal courts are specifically excluded by military decree from challenging any government action.

calling for the immediate and unconditional release of all prisoners of conscience among those convicted, and for the release of others if they are not to be fairly tried according to international standards for fair trial.
