The three people named above appear to have been arrested solely on account of their association with a poster campaign marking Human Rights Day 1997 and calling for the release of prisoners of conscience. Furthermore, they may be held in harsh conditions while detained incommunicado, which raises particular concern for the health of one of them, who was a patient at a medical clinic when he was arrested.

On 17 December, officers of the State Security Service (SSS), the security police, reportedly broke down the doors of the Lagos home and business premises of a supporter of the Free Beko Kuti Campaign Committee, Akanni Iromini. The Committee works for the release of Dr Beko Ransome-Kuti, former Chairman of the Campaign for Democracy and a prominent human rights defender, and other prisoners of conscience, including those, such as Dr Ransome-Kuti, who were sentenced to long prison terms in 1995 after grossly unfair and secret military trials for treason. When the police could not find Akanni Iromini, they reportedly arrested a sales assistant, **Kemi Sobodu**, in his place.

Also on 17 December, the security police arrested **Dr Wale Balogun**, the proprietor of a medical clinic in Lagos, and a patient receiving treatment at the clinic, a **Mr Oboro**. Before he was imprisoned, Dr Ransome-Kuti was in charge of the clinic.

The authorities have not provided information about these arrests or the reasons for them. Under the State Security (Detention of Persons) Decree, No. 2 of 1984, the military government can detain, indefinitely and without charge or trial, any person deemed to be a threat to the security of the state. Legal recourse against arbitrary and unjust detention is specifically removed by the decree, and the authorities routinely ignore court orders for the release of detainees. Prisoners of conscience have been detained for months, sometimes years, under the decree. Conditions for political prisoners in general are harsh and life-threatening: two prisoners of conscience are feared to have died in recent weeks from harsh and insanitary conditions compounded by malnutrition and medical neglect (see UA 387/97, AFR 44/27/97, 9 December and update, AFR 44/28/97, 19 December).

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in English or your own language:

- expressing concern that Kemi Sobodu, Dr Wale Balogun and Mr Oboro may have been arrested on 17 December 1997 solely because of their human rights activities or because of their professional or personal association with human rights defenders;
- asking the reason for their continued detention and urging that they be given immediate access to their families and lawyers;
- expressing concern in particular for the health of Mr Oboro, who was receiving treatment at a medical clinic when he was arrested, and seek assurances that the detainees have access to doctors of their own choice and are receiving appropriate medical care;

- urging that they be released immediately if they are not to be promptly charged with a recognizably criminal offence and fairly tried according to international standards for fair trial.
