Sierra Leone: Amnesty International Secretary General to hold press conference in Freetown after meeting President Kabbah

Mr Sane and Ms. Kordeczka have held meetings with Sierra Leone's Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr Sama Banya, UNAMSIL officials and Sierra Leonean human rights organizations.

Today the delegation is meeting President Ahmad Tejan Kabbah and other government officials including the Minister of Justice and Attorney General, Mr Solomon Berewa. In addition, they will also meet Commander of UK troops and the Nigerian and British High Commissioners.

During these meetings Amnesty International's delegates will convey the following messages among others:

impunity: all those responsible for human rights abuses, including war crimes and crimes against humanity, which have occurred during the internal armed conflict and since the signing of the peace agreement must be brought to justice;

military assistance: any arms or military equipment received by any party of the current conflict must not be used to commit human rights abuses;

child combatants: children under the age of 18 must not be recruited or used by parties to the conflict. The use of child combatants is a war crime and those responsible for recruiting and using child soldiers must be brought to justice;

diamond trade: the role of the trade in diamonds from areas under rebel control in the supply of military assistance to rebel forces must be fully and immediately investigated.
