The 11 people named above were arrested in the Far Northern Transvaal town of Messina on 8 June 1991 and are still being held uncharged. They were apparently arrested in connection with a consumer boycott taking place in Nancefield, the black township near Messina. They were arrested by the South African police and taken initially to Messina police station, but were transferred subsequently to different police stations. Church representatives who tried to visit them at Messina police station on 12 June were denied access to them, apparently on the grounds that they are being held under section 50 of the Internal Security Act (No. 74 of 1982). However, rights permitted to detainees under section 50 of the Act include the right to family visits and right of access to legal counsel.

Section 50 provides for a police officer to arrest any person believed to be contributing to public disturbances and detain them for 48 hours. The detention can be extended for up to 14 days on the authorization of a magistrate, and periods of 14-day detention can in theory be repeatedly renewed. The government's proposed changes to the Internal Security Act, currently before parliament, include no proposal to change the provisions of section 50.

Amnesty International is concerned that these prisoners may have been detained on account of their non-violent political activities, and is calling for them to be released immediately if they are not to be charged promptly with a recognizably criminal offence. The organization is seeking assurances that they are not being subjected to torture or ill-treatment while in custody.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters:

- expressing concern about the detention of those named above and asking for reasons for their detention and where they are currently being held;

- seeking assurances that they are not being subjected to torture or ill-treatment while in the custody of the police;

- urging that they be granted immediate access to legal counsel, to visits from their families and church representatives;

- calling for their immediate and unconditional release if they are not to be brought to trial promptly and fairly on recognizably criminal charges.
