SOUTH AFRICA: Chris KHOZA, African National Congress (ANC) branch chairperson, Mpophomeni township, near Howick, Natal province and other ANC members in the Mpophomeni community

Amnesty International continues to be concerned for the safety of Chris Khoza, ANC branch chairperson in Mpophomeni, as further death threats have been made against him. This concern is heightened by the apparent reluctance of the South African Police (SAP) to investigate actively and credibly the death threats against Chris Khoza and bring those responsible to justice.

An anonymous phone call was made to the Khoza house on 11 May 1993, in which the caller alleged that three Mpophomeni residents were planning to kill Chris Khoza. The three men have denied the allegations. The SAP Crime Intelligence Service in Pietermaritzburg was promptly informed but stated that the police could not monitor the Khozas' home phone line unless the family lodged a formal complaint with the police at the local Howick police station. The family complied with this, but the Howick police refused to allow Chris Khoza's wife to make a statement in private or to give her a copy of her own statement or the reference number of the complaint. This obstructive conduct from the police contradicts earlier police undertakings to investigate the threats to the Khoza family and provide protection for them.

Seven suspects have been charged in connection with five of the 11 murders that took place in Mpophomeni between 8 and 14 April 1993, including three men charged with the murder of Bheki Maseko and a young man in the same house on 14 April. The suspects are in custody at Howick police station. Local residents, however, feel that there are other suspects who have not yet been arrested and that the police are not actively and visibly taking all possible steps to investigate the murders.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters either in English, or your own language:

- expressing continuing concern for the safety of ANC official, Chris Khoza, in view of further death threats against him, and urging the authorities to safeguard him and his family against harassment and attack, and to promptly and thoroughly investigate these threats;
- noting that some suspects have been charged in connection with killings in

Mpophomeni township between 8 and 14 April 1993, but calling for continuing investigation into all the murders and for all the perpetrators to be brought to justice;

- urging the authorities to exercise their responsibility to protect the lives of $\underline{\text{all}}$ residents of Mpophomeni by ensuring that the local police force behaves impartially and responds promptly to calls for assistance and is willing to investigate and arrest the perpetrators of attacks, irrespective of political affiliation.
