

Uganda has seen one of the most high-profile efforts to toughen and broaden criminal provisions on same-sex sexual activity with several attempts since 2009 to introduce the notorious Anti-Homosexuality Bill. Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTI) activists in Uganda have fought tirelessly against the Bill and often face violence and disproportionately high levels of discrimination when accessing healthcare, education, employment and housing.

"Kuchu" is a self-identifying term used used for safety reasons by LGBTI people in Uganda in reference to their sexual orientation or gender identity.
