Jean-Marie Rusimbuka, a staff member of the United Nations Human Rights Field Office for the Congo (HRFOC), was released without charge on 10 January. It is believed that diplomatic pressure on the DRC government, from the UN and others, helped secure his release.

He had been held since 3 January at a detention centre run by the security service known as *Détection militaire des activités anti-patrie* (DEMIAP), Military Detection of Unpatriotic Activities. He was reportedly questioned about his involvement with the family of Anselme Masasu Nindaga, one of the suspected ringleaders of an alleged coup plot against the government, but he was not ill-treated. He is now required to report to DEMIAP three times a week until further notice, and his passport has been confiscated.

None of the others detained in connection with the alleged coup plot are known to have been released, and Amnesty International is concerned that they remain at risk of torture while they are held incommunicado. Some have reportedly "disappeared".

## FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in French, English or your own language:

- welcoming the release of Jean-Marie Rusimbuka, but expressing concern that over 100 others are still held without charge, including Jeanine Mukanirwa of PAIF;
- expressing alarm that Aimée Ntabarusha Mungu and her baby have reportedly "disappeared", and urging the authorities to reveal where she and all the other detainees are held;
- expressing concern that the detainees are at risk of torture while held incommunicado, and calling for them to be granted immediate access to their families, lawyers and medical care;
- asking what formal charges, if any, the detainees face, asking that any legal proceedings against them conform to international fair trial standards, including the right to legal representation of choice, adequate time to prepare defence and the right to appeal before a higher court.
