Your Excellency, Mr Sérgio Cabral Filho,

Hundreds of communities in Rio de Janeiro continue to live under the shadow of increasingly powerful *milicias*. Communities already suffering from entrenched poverty are being driven even further to the margins of society by the domination of these organized criminal gangs.

More than 400 *milicia* members have been arrested. However, little has been done to address the web of illegal economic activities – which extend to the control of essential services such as transport, gas and telecommunications – that fuel these criminal organizations.

We are calling on you to implement the recommendations of the parliamentary inquiry into *milicias* and to work with municipal authorities, companies and the Public Prosecutor's Office to create joint agreements to end *milicia* domination of services in these communities.

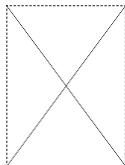
Only by ending these illegal rackets can the authorities tackle the *milicias'* reign of violence, extortion and persecution and fulfil their duty to ensure the human rights of all.
