together. Do you remember that judge

the one who refused to investigate my sister's case? Mama explained to him, proved everything she had to prove.

I saw my daughter, sir, I saw her with my own eyes. What else did she have to explain after that to the judge?

My breasts hurt, mommy,

was all that my sister said, and go away, go away

before they kill you.

And the judge said she was lying,

and that the word of an officer in the Chilean army

was worth more much much more than a thousand of hers,

my beautiful sister her breasts hurt that day

when the old lady finally found her in that damned hospital.

That judge's house

has strong iron bars on the windows.

In the few minutes it takes

for the police to arrive he'll have time to recognize the forty women,

recognize them one by one.

Time to understand

before he closes the curtains

the things my mother will do

to find the daughter they arrested

the year the month the day when a blue car stops parking

in front of the door of her house

a car with four men

And the phone doesn't ring

at three in the morning.

Then the judge will turn out the lights and ask himself why nobody is coming to help him and he will keep on looking and

looking and

looking

from behind every curtain at the chain of mothers in the street.
