UA 45/95 Fear of "disappearance"

COLOMBIARodrigo RODRÍGUEZ SIERRA, aged 35, trade union leader

Trade union leader Rodrigo Rodríguez Sierra was forcefully abducted on 16 February 1995 from a hotel in Barranquilla, Atlántico department, by armed men who identified themselves as members of the security forces. He has not been seen since and concern for his safety is growing by the day.

Witnesses report that Rodrigo Rodríguez was in the restaurant of the Hotel Diamante, located on Calle 41, No.38-65 of Barranquilla when, at approximately 7.45pm, a group of armed men entered the hotel. They identified themselves to the hotel's manager as members of the security forces and went immediately to the restaurant where they found Rodrigo Rodriguez. He was taken violently from the restaurant. No warrant for his arrest had been presented. The armed men reportedly stated that "he had problems with justice", "tenía problemas con la justicia".

From the moment of his abduction, his family and work colleagues made all possible efforts to locate him, without success. On 17 February, at 3.30pm, a writ of *habeas corpus* was submitted to the 12th Penal Judge of Barranquilla, *el Juez 12 Penal del Circuito de la ciudad de Barranquilla*.

Rodrigo Rodríguez is one the leaders of the olive-oil producers' union SINTRAPROACEITE, based in El Copey, Cesar department.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In recent years widespread and systematic human rights violations have occurred in Colombia, including extrajudicial executions, "disappearance", torture and arbitrary arrest. Particular targets have been trade union and community leaders and members of left-wing parties. President Ernesto Samper Pizano, who assumed office on 7 August 1994, has publicly stated that tackling the human rights situation will be a priority for his government. However, members of the Colombian security forces continue to commit serious abuses with virtual impunity. Only exceptionally are perpetrators brought to justice; the vast majority of members of the armed forces responsible for gross human rights violations remain in active service.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters either in Spanish or in your own language:

- expressing concern for the safety of Rodrigo Rodríguez Sierra, who has not been seen since he was violently abducted from a Barranquilla hotel on 16 February, by armed men who identified themselves as members of the Colombian security forces;

- urging that there be an immediate and thorough investigation into his whereabouts, the results of which should be made public and those found responsible for his abduction brought to justice;

- urging that, if he is in detention, that he be humanely treated, allowed access to lawyers and to his family and that he be released unless charged with a recognized criminal offence
