COLOMBIAJhon Fredy Restrepo Arango, businessman

Businessman Jhon Fredy Restrepo Arango has not been seen since 28 March, when he left his hotel in Bucaramanga, capital of the northeastern department of Santander. He had received death threats before, and it is feared that he may have "disappeared".

He left the hotel at about 4pm, heading for the bus station. He had planned to travel to Medellín to visit his one-year-old son, who was ill. He never arrived at the bus station.

In late 1999 an armed group had demanded "protection money" from Jhon Fredy's business, in Medellín. He moved to Cúcuta, in Norte de Santander department, to escape death threats from the group, which is believed to have links with paramilitary death squads.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Jhon Fredy's brother, Nelson Restrepo Arango, is a well-known human rights activist. He worked in the human rights program of the *Instituto Popular de Capacitación* (Popular Training Institute) in Medellín until the end of last year, when death threats forced him to leave the country.

The Colombian armed forces and their paramilitary allies commit serious human rights violations with virtual impunity. In the last five years several thousand civilians have been killed or "disappeared" at the hands of paramilitary groups, who continue to work with the support of the security forces in many areas of the country despite the government making it illegal to set up paramilitary organizations, and issuing directives to the armed forces to combat and disband such groups in 1989. Guerrilla forces have also committed serious human rights abuses, including executions of people they accuse of collaborating with the security forces or paramilitaries.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in Spanish or your own language:

- expressing concern for the safety of Jhon Fredy Restrepo Arango, who was last seen on 28 March in the city of Bucaramanga;
- calling for an immediate, full and impartial investigation to establish his whereabouts.
