UA 259/93 Indiscriminate use of lethal force

Amnesty International is concerned at the indiscriminate use of lethal force by members of the Civil Defence Patrols against peaceful demonstrators on 3 August 1993 which allegedly resulted in the death of one person and the wounding of several others.

According to the information received by Amnesty International, on 3 August several hundred peasants, *campesinos*, members of the <u>Comité de Unidad Campesina</u> (CUC), <u>Consejo Nacional de Desplazados de Guatemala</u> (CONDEG), and <u>Coordinadora Nacional de Viudas de Guatemala</u> (CONAVIGUA), staged a peaceful demonstration to protest against alleged threats and harassment of the people of Colotenango by members of the army and the Civil Defence Patrols. When the demonstrators were assembled in the village of El Naranjal, municipality of Colotenango, Huehuetenanago, members of the Civil Defence Patrols reportedly fired indiscriminately against the crowd, killing Juan Pablo Chanay and wounding several others, among them Miguel Morales, Lucía Quilá and a Belgian journalist. There are unconfirmed reports that at least two other demonstrators were killed in the incident.

The local Human Rights Procurator, the Departmental Governor, the commander of the military zone and other state authorities had reportedly been invited to meet with the demonstrators. The organizers of the demonstration had also allegedly met the local military commander to discuss their grievances.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Civil Defence Patrols (PAC) were created as a component of the military counter-insurgency strategy in 1982. Although voluntary according to the Constitution, civil patrols are in effect compulsory. Those refusing to take part in them have been branded "guerrillas" and many have been subjected to human rights violations, including harassment and attacks, "disappearance" and extrajudicial execution.

For many years Amnesty International has been concerned about human rights violations in Guatemala. Trade unionists, student leaders, journalists and those working with non-governmental organizations have been long-term targets of abuses, including harassment, threats, torture, "disappearances" and extrajudicial executions.

On 6 June 1993 Ramiro de León Carpio, previously Human Rights Procurator, was voted President, almost unanimously, by Congress to serve out the remaining term of President Jorge Serrano

Elías. Ex-President Serrano had been forced from office after trying to seize near-dictatorial powers on 25 May 1993.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes and airmail letters either in Spanish, English or in your own language:

- expressing concern at reports that on 3 August 1993 demonstrators at El Naranjal, Colotenango were indiscriminately fired at by members of the Civil Defence Patrols;

- expressing concern that Juan Pablo Chanay was killed and several others, including Miguel Morales, Lucía Quilá and a Belgian journalist were wounded;

- urging that this incident be immediately investigated and that those found responsible be brought to justice;

- urging the authorities to ensure that the <u>United Nations Basic Principles on the Use</u> of Force and Firearms by Law Enforcement Officials adopted in 1990, which restrict the use of force and firearms against non-violent demonstrators, are respected and to inform all members of the security forces that human rights violations, including the killing of unarmed civilians, are criminal offences and that those responsible should be brought to justice;

- urging for an investigation into the allegations of threats and harassment of the people of Coloteanango by members of the armed forces and the Civil Defence Patrols.
