UA 261/93 "Disappearance"/Fear for Physical Safety 6 August 1993

GUATEMALA: Cirilo MACHIC RAGUAY, trade union leader

Amnesty International is concerned for the physical safety of Cirilo Machic Raguay who "disappeared" on 26 July 1993 while travelling on the road to Escuintla, municipality of Palín.

According to the information received by Amnesty International, Cirilo Machic Raguay is a member of the Executive Committee of the Road Workers Union, <u>Sindicato de Trabajadores de Caminos</u> (STRAC), of the municipality of Palín and a member of the Union of Workers of Escuintla, <u>Unión de Trabajadores de</u> <u>Escuintla</u> (UTE). It is reported that Cirilo Machic Raguay was actively working on the setting up of neighbourhood associations in Palín and that these associations have been critical of the local mayor. According to his wife, before his "disappearance" Cirilo Machic Raguay had been followed and intimidated by heavily armed men in a car with foreign number plates. It is reported that members of other non-governmental organizations in Escuintla have also been subjected to acts of intimidation.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

For many years Amnesty International has been concerned about human rights violations directed against targeted groups, including trade unionists, student leaders, journalists and those working with non-governmental organizations, particularly those attempting to investigate and protect human rights. They have been long-term targets of abuses in Guatemala, including harassment, threats, torture, "disappearances" and extrajudicial executions. Such abuses have sometimes been preceded by acts of intimidation and surveillance.

On 6 June 1993 Ramiro de León Carpio, previously Human Rights Procurator, was voted President by Congress, following his near-unanimous election by Congress to serve out the remaining term of President Jorge Serrano Elías. Ex-President Serrano had been forced from office after trying to seize near-dictatorial powers.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters either in Spanish, English or in your own language:

- expressing concern at the "disappearance" of Cirilo Machic Raguay, on 26 July 1993 in the road to Escuintla;

- urging the authorities to immediately and thoroughly investigate his "disappearance" and that the results be made public;

- urging that if in detention, Cirilo Machic Raguay be humanely treated and given access to relatives, a lawyer and if necessary a doctor;

- urging that if in detention, he be brought before a judge and either be released or charged with a recognized criminal offence.
