Amnesty International is concerned about the reported "disappearance". of Néstor Medina Rojas after his detention by members of the police.

According to reports received by Amnesty International, Néstor Rojas Medina, aged 20, was detained on 26 January 1991 by members of the police in the town of Tocache, Tocache province, San Martín department. The reports indicate that the detainee was taken to a police station in Tocache, and that he was later transferred to the Tocache Military Base, where his detention was denied. His relatives denounced the case to the relevant authorities and asked parliamentary representatives to obtain information of his whereabouts, but no further information has been received. However, on the basis of recent information from the Tocache police, members of the Rojas Medina family have concluded that Néstor Rojas continues to be held by the military.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

For the last eight years Amnesty International has received numerous reports of unacknowledged detentions from Peru, some of which have led to "disappearances". Most of them have occurred in rural areas and have been carried out by uniformed members of the security forces. Many of those detained "disappear" indefinitely; others are released after days or weeks in secret custody, during which time they may be subjected to torture. Sometimes their detention is acknowledged after prolonged secret detention and interrogation. In these cases detentions are only acknowledged to have occurred as of the date they are transferred from military to police custody, when public prosecutors are informed of them. The armed forces as a rule never acknowledge having held prisoners prior to their transfer to the competent authority. This is a major contributing factor to the continuing practice of torture and "disappearance".

Human rights violations take place in a context of increasingly violent activities by armed opposition groups, especially "Sendero Luminoso", which has claimed responsibility for hundreds of execution-style killings of government officials, leaders of political parties and members of peasant communities believed to have cooperated with the armed forces.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Telegrams/telexes/faxes/express and airmail letters:

- expressing concern about the reported "disappearance" of Néstor Rojas Medina after his arrest by members of the Tocache police, and detention in the Tocache military base;
- asking that his detention be acknowledged and that while held he be humanely treated and given access to a lawyer, a doctor and his relatives,

- asking that he be promptly brought before a competent authority and charged, or be immediately released.
