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UA 199/91 "Disappearance" 11 June 1991

PERU: Wilian GUERRA GONZALES, aged 30

Amnesty International is concerned about the reported "disappearance" of Wilian Guerra Gonzáles, father of two children, after his detention by the army in the district of Aucayacu, province of Leoncio Prado, department of Huánuco.

According to reports, on the night of 17 May 1991 Wilian Guerra was detained in his home by members of the army from the military base at Aucayacu. The detention was reportedly witnessed by the father of Wilian Guerra.

When enquiries were made at the military base, where he was believed to be held, the army refused to acknowledge the detention. The <a href="Fiscal">Fiscal</a>
<a href="Provincial">Provincial</a>, Provincial Prosecutor of Leoncio Prado has sent a letter of enquiry to the head of the Aucayacu military base, but as far as Amnesty International is aware no reply has been received.

## BACKGROUND INFORMATION

For the last eight years Amnesty International has received numerous reports of incommunicado and unacknowledged detentions from Peru, some of which have led to "disappearances". Most of them have occurred in rural areas and have been carried out by uniformed members of the security forces, who often refuse to acknowledge the detentions. Many of those detained by the armed forces "disappear" indefinitely; others are released after days or weeks in secret custody, during which time they may be subjected to torture. Sometimes their detention is acknowledged, after prolonged secret detention and interrogation. In these cases detentions are only acknowledged to have occurred as of the date the detainees are transferred from military to police custody, when public prosecutors are informed of the detention. The armed forces as a rule never acknowledge having held prisoners prior to their transfer to the police. This is a major contributing factor to the continuing practice of torture and "disappearance".

Human rights violations take place in a context of increasingly violent activities by armed opposition groups, especially "Sendero Luminoso", which has claimed responsibility for hundreds of execution-style killings of government officials, leaders of left-wing political parties and members of peasant communities believed to have cooperated with the armed forces.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION: Telegrams/telexes and airmail letters:

- expressing concern about the reported "disappearance" of Wiliam Guerra Gonzáles after his detention by members of the army;
- urging that his whereabouts and legal situation be immediately clarified;
- urging that he be immediately brought before a judge or released;
- asking that, while in detention, he be humanely treated and given access to lawyers, a doctor and relatives.
