AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL LAUNCHES WORLDWIDE CAMPAIGN ON HUMAN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS IN CHINA

Amnesty International is launching its first ever worldwide campaign on China on 13 March 1996, highlighting increasing repression by a government which clamps down brutally on any action perceived as a threat to the established order.

The organization's Secretary General, Pierre Sané, will launch the campaign and a comprehensive report on human rights violations in China in Bangkok – the first stop in a campaigning tour which includes Hong Kong and Tokyo.

At the press conference, the Secretary General will spotlight the widespread repression of dissent and the use of torture and capital punishment – all of which are underscored by the abuse of the Chinese legal system by the country's officials.

Such human rights violations have taken place against a backdrop of economic reforms which have opened China up to foreign investment. Despite sporadic international protest over human rights violations, foreign governments have failed to consistently condemn the abuse of basic rights for fear of jeopardising investment opportunities.

During the 10-day campaigning tour, the Secretary General will seek meetings with representatives of the Chinese government in Bangkok, Hong Kong and Tokyo, and will also meet with non-governmental organizations and business leaders.
