Amnesty International fears that those named above, all currently being held in incommunicado detention under the Internal Security Act (ISA) could be at risk of ill-treatment. The whereabouts of some remain unknown.

Previous ISA detainees are known to have been placed in conditions of aggravated mental and physical distress induced by sleep deprivation, threats and slaps and by being forced to stand for prolonged periods under excessively cold air-conditioners.

The organization has also learned of the incommunicado detention under the ISA of the following people: Ahmad Shabrinin Mohamad Sidek, Asmon Ismail and Dr. Zamri Abdul Kadir.

Please note that Anwar associate S. Nallakarupan, currently facing charges of illegally possessing ammunition, is considered a possible prisoner of conscience.

On 23 September 1998 a restriction order, under the ISA, was issued against the wife of Anwar Ibrahim, Dr. Wan Azizah, prohibiting her from speaking at public rallies or attending "political" gatherings at home. If Wan Azizha breaks the terms of the restriction orders she faces detention without trial.

Police have released on bail at least 120 demonstrators arrested at rallies on 20 and 21 September following Anwar Ibrahim's detention. However, in spite of a nationwide ban on all further "pro-reform" rallies, demonstrations in support of Anwar continued on 25 September, when police entered the National Mosque in Kuala Lumpur to disperse a crowd expressing support for Anwar. FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/ airmail letters in Malaysian / English or in your own language: - urging that the 15 detainees, held in incommunicado detention at an unknown location, are not ill-treated; - urging the government to respect the right of Malaysians to peaceful assembly and for the police to exercise maximum restraint in their treatment of demonstrators.
