On 30 January the 16 students named above were brought before officials at the district administration office in Kathmandu to have their statements recorded. This is the first time they have been seen since they were arrested on 28 December 2000 from the office of the All Nepal National Free Students Union (ANNFSU) (Revolutionary).

Fifteen of the students had reportedly been coerced into signing statements that they were not allowed to read on 29 January. These statements were used by police to obtain extensions on the detention orders against them. The district administration set bail at 10,000 rupees per student. As none of the students was able to pay this, they were remanded to custody in Central Jail, Kathmandu.

Following their arrest, the students had reportedly been detained at Hanuman Dhoka police station, where some of them were allegedly subjected to torture. The police denied having them in their custody. The students were later transferred to an unofficial place of detention, where they were held incommunicado.

The students were first brought before the district authorities four days after their arrest. They were detained under the Public Security Act, which allows local authorities to keep people in preventive detention "in order to maintain public order" for up to 30 days. Such detention orders can be extended for up to 90 days at the Home Ministry's discretion.

Although the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has asked the authorities for access to the students, its officers have apparently not been able to visit them to date. The students have also not been allowed access to their families or lawyers while in police custody.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in English or in your own language:

- expressing concern that some of the 16 students, including Keshar Raj Rimal and Munal Khadka, were allegedly subjected tortured while in police custody, and may be in need of medical treatment;
- calling on the authorities to allow the detainees immediate access to their relatives, lawyers and any medical treatment they may require;
- expressing concern that the NHRC has not been given access to them;
- urging that they be promptly charged with a recognizably criminal offence, or else immediately released;
- requesting the government to instigate an independent and impartial investigation into the reported torture and illegal detention of the sixteen students, and, if the reports are substantiated, take steps to bring those responsible to justice.
