Mohammad Ameen (m)

Mohammad Ameen's family are negotiating with the family of the man he was convicted of murdering, with a view to arranging payment of compensation to secure his release. Under Pakistan's law of *Qisas Diyat* (retribution/compensation), anyone sentenced to death for murder may be pardoned if the victim's family agree to accept payment in this way.

Mohammad Ameen was convicted of involvement in a February 1998 robbery and killing, and sentenced to death in January 2001 by a court in the city of Rawalpindi. After a series of failed appeals, he petitioned President Musharraf for mercy in August 2003. The president has not yet answered his petition.

He was reportedly 16 years old at the time of the offence. Under international law, and Pakistan's Juvenile Justice System Ordinance (JJSO) of July 2000, no one may be executed for crimes committed when they were under 18.

Many thanks to all who took action on this case. Because of the sensitive nature of the negotiations now in progress, no further appeals should be sent at present. We will be monitoring the case closely, and will advise the UA network of any developments.
