Amnesty International to visit Sri Lanka

An Amnesty International delegation will visit Sri Lanka from 16 - 30 June to lobby for human rights protection to be put at the centre of peace negotiations. The delegates will meet both the government and, for the first time, the leadership of Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE).

They will travel to the Vanni to meet with the LTTE leadership during the first week and then return to Colombo to hold meetings with the new Sri Lankan government. The delegates will also meet with local human rights organizations, peace movements and the business community.

"Human rights protection has taken a back seat to hostilities over the past 19-years. However, the current ceasefire and imminent peace talks offer both sides a real opportunity to put human rights squarely on the agenda," Amnesty International's Sri Lanka Researcher, Ingrid Massage, said. "Security and peace depend on it."

The delegation will also take the opportunity to raise specific concerns with both parties. Among the issues to be raised with the government will be; impunity, the death penalty, women's rights, review of the Prevention of Terrorism Act, and the rights of refugees and internally displaced people. With the LTTE leaders, the delegation will discuss reports of the recruitment of child soldiers, the return to their families, and rehabilitation; as well as the return of internally displaced Muslims (who were forced to leave their homes by the LTTE in 1990), and other issues.
