Title: Kenya: Torture, compounded by the denial of medical care

Abstract: Torture and ill-treatment in Kenya continue. The security forces routinely use torture to extract confessions and political prisoners are harassed and ill-treated. Prison conditions are harsh and medical treatment is often refused or given too late. Doctors who attempt to treat political prisoners are harassed by the police and prison staff. Torture methods are frequently brutal involving beating, near suffocation, sexual humiliation and rape. The Kenyan government has responded to criticism of its human rights record by making largely cosmetic changes with little lasting effect. Without significant international pressure Kenya is unlikely to prevent torture and police brutality or address allegations of human rights violations by the security forces. The report calls on the Kenyan government to implement extensive recommendations which, if effectively implemented, will help to end the pattern of human rights violations in Kenya.

Abstract: It has been reported that at least 13 people were seriously injured during a violent confrontation between squatter peasants (posseiros) belonging to the Movimento de Trabalhadores Rurais Sem Terra (MST), Movement for Landless Rural Workers, and military police on 8 November in Santa Isabel do Ivaí, state of Parana. The peasants suffered from gunshot wounds and abrasions and bruising. There is also concern that several peasants were beaten and shot at after they had been handcuffed. According to a report by the Special Commission of the

Legislative Assembly of the state of Parana, "the action taken by the military police was violent, rash and pre-planned".

Title: Indonesia: Women in Indonesia and East Timor: standing against repression

Abstract: Women in Indonesia and East Timor suffer human rights violations including extrajudicial executions, "disappearances", torture, arbitrary arrest, unfair trial, imprisonment for peaceful expression of opposition to the government, and the death penalty. Most of these women live in poor, isolated communities and are often employed as labourers. They have limited access to independent lawyers or human rights groups. This report documents political imprisonment in Indonesia and East Timor including women prisoners of conscience, women detained arbitrarily and harassed on political grounds, human rights violations against women labour activists, torture and ill-treatment of women detainees including those detained as suspected prostitutes and ill-treatment in the context of family

planning. The final section examines women at risk of extrajudicial executions, "disappearances" and the death penalty.

Abstract: This report contains the cases of North Koreans AI believes may have been detained in North Korea. Independent research and verification of information on North Korea are difficult due to restrictions on information imposed by government policies. The response by the North Korean authorities to cases raised by AI in 1993 and 1994 is given. However, AI believes that in a number of cases the information provided is unsatisfactory. The cases of a number of North Koreans forcibly returned from the Russian Federation and China are detailed. Recommendations are made to the North Korean authorities including the undertaking to treat the issue of human rights with openness and as a matter of international responsibility and accountability.

Title: Republic of Korea (South Korea): Arrest of trade union leader Kwon Young-kil

Abstract: Kwon Young-kil, a trade union leader, was arrested on 23 November 1995. He is co-President of a new trade union federation, the Korean Confederation of Trade Unions (KCTU, Minju Noehong) which was formally inaugurated on 11 November

1995. Under provisions of South Korea's labour legislation, prohibiting "third party intervention", the KCTU is an illegal body. Yang Kyu-hun, the KCTU's other co-President, who is in hiding, is also wanted by the police. It is believed that Kwon Young-kil has been arrested for the peaceful exercise of his trade union activities and, as a prisoner of conscience, should be immediately and unconditionally released. Amnesty International is also calling for the amendment of Article 13-2 of the Labour Dispute Mediation Act in line with international standards relating to freedom of expression.

Title: Pakistan: Women in Pakistan: disadvantaged and denied their human rights

Abstract: Women in Pakistan suffer widespread human rights violations in a society where women are disadvantaged in many areas. Torture, including rape in custody by police officers, is widespread but few officers have been prosecuted for this offence. The Zina Ordinance which punishes sexual offences may be used against the actual victim of rape and hundreds of women are imprisoned under it. Cruel, inhuman and degrading punishments such as stoning and flogging are used against women and girls. The government of Pakistan has taken some measures to improve the situation for women but abuses of women's human rights continue with the use of the tribal system of retribution, village councils and bonded labour to punish women. AI makes a series of recommendations to the Government of Pakistan to improve women's rights.
