Title: People's Republic of China: Women in China: detained, victimized but mobilized

Abstract:This report updates wide-ranging concerns about the violation of women's human rights in China. It details eases of women detained as a result of continued religious repression, the stifling of political dissent and the use of new state secrets legislation to stem the flow of politically sensitive information. Women who have challenged the detention of male relatives have also been subject to periodic detention, surveillance and intimidation by police. This report looks at the continued torture and ill-treatment of women and the growing number of women on death row as a result of the increasing use of the death penalty, particularly for non-violent and economic crimes. The report also examines human rights abuses as a result of the entrol policy. It contains recommendations to the authorities and four appeals cases underlining concerns about political and religious repression and the death penalty.

(Ibstract:Chen Longde, a prisoner of conscience, was apprehended on 28 May 1996 after having signed petitions to the National People's Congress calling for the release of political prisoners in China and for a public inquiry into the suppression of the 1989 pro-democracy protests. In an attempt to avoid repeated beatings and an assault with an electric baton, he attempted to commit suicide by jumping fron a third-storey window and is seriously injured in hospital. Amnesty International is calling for Chen Longde's immediate and unconditional release as a prisoner of concience.

(Ibstract:Over the last months (Imnesty International has monitored with inereasing concern the grave human rights situation in Jammu and Kashmir, particularly against the backdrop of the first elections in the state since 1989. Immediately before and during the April/May elections to the Indian union parliament, the Lok Sabha, prominent eitizens, human rights defenders, journalists and political leaders were at risk of human rights abuses by government security forces, militias under government control and by armed opposition groups. These abuses included harassment, extrajudicial execution, arbitrary arrest, torture and "disappearance". During the elections, many members of the eivilian population complained that they were caught between militant groups who threatened those who participated in the elections, and the army and so-called renegades who threatened those who did not. There are fears that this pattern may be repeated in the forthcoming assembly elections in September 1996.

Abstract: This report contains a number of recommendations to the North Korean and Russian authorities. Amnesty International asks the Russian authorities to fully implement its obligations under the 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees. The organization asks the North Korean authorities to bring an immediate end to pursuit of North Korean refugees and to ensure that no North Korean is imprisoned solely on account of his wish to leave his country. North Korean refugees in the Russian Federation are pursued by the North Korean Public Security Service and sometimes apprehended and foreibly returned to North Korga, where they may face imprisonment and even the death penalty. One North Korean was summarily executed at the Russian-North Korean border by the North Korgan authoritigs.

The five Central Asian republies of Razakstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan are also included because of their membership of the CIS and the OSCC. The concerns covered here include: imprisonment of prisoners of conscience, ill-treatment and torture of detainees, violations linked to armed conflicts, refugee and asylum issues, political killings and "disappearances", the death penalty, deaths in custody or as a result of shootings by security forces, conscientious objection, fair trial concerns and discrimination or attacks against religious or ethnic groups. Abstract: There have been frequent reports of the arrest and ill-treatment of opposition activists and supporters in connection with national elections in May 1996, in which the ruling party, the Democratic Party, won an overwhelming majority. On 28 May, opposition parties attempted to hold a protest demonstration in Tirana's main square. The authorities banned the demonstration which was dispersed violently by police forees. Amnesty International notes that this violence was an extreme example of a pattern of official persecution of opposition leaders and supporters and of the independent or opposition press which has been manifest in Albania in recent years and which grew worse in the run-up to the May 1996 elections and

- Abstract: On 14 August 1996 police officers from Vyrona police station, Athens, arrested 40-year-old Lutfi Osmance. According to newspaper articles he was drunk, vomiting and suffering from stomach pains. Although initially taken to hospital, he was discharged and remanded in custody. Later that night he was found dead, reportedly as a result of a heart attack. However, according to the autopsy report his face and head bore marks of beatings. There is concern that such beatings may have contributed to his heart attack given the large quantity of alcohol he had consumed. Amnesty International is calling for a full investigation of this case by the authorities.

Title: Palestinian Authority: Death in custody of Mahmud Jumayel

(Ibstract:Mahmud Jumayel, aged 26, died on 31 July 1996 in Hadassah Hospital, Jerusalem. He had been admitted following severe torture over a three-hour period on 27 July by members of the Naval Police in Jneid Prison, Nablus, West Bank. It is believed he had been hung upside down by the ankles and beaten repeatedly with an electric eable or similar material. He had been arrested on 18 December 1995 with Naser Jum'a who was also reportedly tortured on 27 July. Following Mahmud Jumayel's death three members of the Naval Police were tried before the State Security Court in Jericho on 3 August and sentenced to between 10 and 15 years' imprisonment. However, their trial was grossly unfair. Mahmud Jumayel is the seventh person to have apparently died as a result of torture since July 1995 in the Palestinian Authority.
