BELARUSYury Zakharenko

Leading opposition politician Yury Zakharenko has now been missing for four months, and Amnesty International fears he may be in incommunicado detention, where he could be at risk of torture.

Oleg Volchek, the head of a commission set up by the Belarussian opposition to investigate the former Minister of the Interior's sudden disappearance, said in August that there was evidence that he had been detained on Zhykovsky street in Minsk and forced into a car. The authorities have been reluctant to investigate, and Oleg Volchek is now being prosecuted in connection with his opposition activities.

Yury Zakharenko's family have not heard from him since 7 May, when he reportedly telephoned his daughter to say he was on his way home at about 8pm. His wife believes that he has been arrested by the government for his involvement is the unofficial presidential elections, that took place on 16 May, that were organised by opposition groups in protest against President Lukashenka.

On 31 August his mother, Ulyana Zakharenko, appealed to President Lukashenka in an open letter entitled "Give My Son Back", in which she wrote: "I wish somebody would tell me that Yura has not been murdered or tortured to death. I cannot sleep, cannot live my life without him."

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please continue sending telegrams/faxes/express/airmail letters in English, Russian or your own language:

- urging that the whereabouts of Yury Zakharenko be immediately established and made known to his family, and that if he is in police custody he be given immediate access to his family, and to legal representation;
- urging that any criminal charges against him are made public;
- urging that he is protected from any form of ill-treatment.

APPEALS TO:

Since the telephone system in Belarus is unreliable, fax tones may be difficult to obtain. Please keep trying (it can help to dial slowly). You may have most success during office hours, as fax machines are sometimes turned off at the end of the working day (+2 hours GMT). If a voice answers, repeat "fax" until connected.
