It is now known that Yusup Kuliyev, who was feared to have "disappeared" following his arrest on 20 October 1994 by agents of the Committee for State Security (KGB), was detained in the KGB's investigation-isolation prison in the capital, Ashgabat, until around 6 November, when he was released. Sources report that he was released because of serious ill health which was the consequence of his having been tortured during detention. The sources allege that Yusup Kuliyev was severely beaten and forcibly administered with drugs to cause him pain.

Yusup Kuliyev is now under house arrest in Ashgabat. He has reportedly been charged with preparing an attempt to assassinate President Saparmurad Niyazov. To Amnesty International's knowledge, no such attempt on the life of the President has taken place, and unofficial sources claim that the charge is a fabrication intended to punish Yusup Kuliyev for being a sympathizer of the political opposition in Turkmenistan.

Two other people are in detention in the KGB investigation-isolation prison in Ashgabat on the same charge as Yusup Kuliyev. They are Khoshali Garayev and Mukhammad Aymuradov. Although of ethnic Turkmen origin, both men are citizens of Russia. They were arrested on 27 October 1994 in Tashkent, the capital of Uzbekistan, by Turkmen KGB agents allegedly acting with the cooperation of the Uzbekistan authorities. As with Yusup Kuliyev, sources claim that the charge against these men is also fabricated and is intended to punish them for opposition sympathies.

Amnesty International believes that Yusup Kuliyev, Khoshali Garayev and Mukhammad Aymuradov may be prisoners of conscience, and is seeking more information about the charge against them. In the light of the reports about the treatment of Yusup Kuliyev while in detention, Amnesty International is gravely concerned that Khoshali Garayev and Mukhammad Aymuradov may also be at risk of torture. FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/faxes/express and airmail letters

calling for an explanation of the exact nature of and basis for the criminal charges against Yusup Kuliyev, Khoshali Garayev and Mukhammad Aymuradov;
calling on the authorities to guarantee the physical safety and well-being of Khoshali Garayev and Mukhammad Aymuradov and to ensure that they are not subjected to torture;

- expressing concern about reports that Yusup Kuliyev was tortured while in the custody of the KGB, and urging the authorities to ensure that Yusup Kuliyev receives proper medical treatment.
