# Ivan Novkovi\_, technician Other anti-government demonstrators

Demonstrators calling for the release of imprisoned technician Ivan Novkovi and an end to repression of news media were beaten and detained by riot police in the southern Serbian town of Leskovac on 6 July 1999. Amnesty International is concerned that they may be ill-treated in detention.

On 5 July 1999, Ivan Novkovi\_, who works for a television station in Leskovac, was sentenced to 30 days in prison for arranging an anti-government protest without giving advance warning to the authorities. The following day a crowd of demonstrators started moving towards the police station, chanting, "Go away Slobo" and "We want Ivan". They were violently dispersed by police in riot gear, who reportedly beat several demonstrators. Other protesters were reportedly detained without charge after the demonstration.

Further protests are planned in many towns throughout Serbia, which could result in further arbitrary arrests and police brutality.

#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Since the end of the NATO air strikes tens of thousands of people have taken part in anti-government demonstrations across Serbia, calling on FRY President Slobodan Miloševi\_, indicted by the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia for war crimes, to resign. In May, during the NATO air strikes, anti-government demonstrations in several Serbian towns were violently broken up by police and an unknown number of demonstrators were detained.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in English or your own language: (please note that at present no mail is being delivered from the UK)

expressing concern at the imprisonment of Ivan Novkovi\_, and urging the authorities to ensure that he is not ill-treated in detention;
expressing concern at the reports that police beat demonstrators in the town of Leskovac on 6 July 1999;
calling for a prompt, thorough and impartial investigation into all reports of police ill-treatment;
urging the immediate and unconditional release of anyone detained for the non-violent exercise of their right to freedom of assembly and freedom of expression;
emphasising that Articles 19 and 21 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (to which Yugoslavia is a state party) guarantee the rights of freedom of expression and assembly respectively.
