# FOUR DOCTORS IN DETENTION

Drs 'Issam al-'Iryan, Ibrahim al-Za'farani, Mohammad Salama and Medhat Mohammad 'Abd al-Ghani

#### **EGYPT**

Four Egyptian doctors were arrested in the early hours of 22 January 1995 and are being held under consecutive 15-day detention orders. Two of the doctors are office holders within the Egyptian Medical Syndicate, Egypt's national medical association. They are **Dr 'Issam al-'Iryan**, Deputy Secretary General of the Medical Syndicate in Cairo and former member of the People's Assembly (parliament) and **Dr Ibrahim al-Za'farani**, Secretary General of the Alexandria branch of the Syndicate. The other two are **Dr Mohammad Salama**, a general practitioner in Badrashin, Cairo and **Dr Medhat Mohammad 'Abd al-Ghani**, a general practitioner in al-Zagaziq, north of Cairo.

Upon arrest they were issued with 15-day detention orders by the State Security Prosecutor and these were renewed in early February. The renewed detention orders were issued on 2 February for Drs al-'Iryan, Salama and 'Abd al-Ghani and on 4 February for Dr al-Za'Farani. All are reportedly members of the Muslim Brothers, an Islamist movement which is officially banned but tolerated in practice. Members and leaders of this movement operate freely and are influential within Egyptian society. The Muslim Brothers are dominant within the Medical Syndicate and several other professional associations. Twenty-three other members of the movement were arrested on the same day.

Those arrested have now reportedly been charged with "membership of a secret organization whose aim is to attempt to overthrow the regime by force, possession of hostile printed materials and contacts with foreign quarters". All are believed to be held in Istiqbal Tora prison, outside Cairo.

According to reports received by Amnesty International, the reason for their arrest may be that they had begun to campaign for parliamentary elections which are to be held in November 1995.

It would appear that the government is intent on clamping down on professional associations where the Muslim Brothers are influential. Dozens of lawyers were arrested in May 1994 and these arrests were followed by those of a number of journalists.

The Muslim Brothers have, as an organization, condemned the violence carried out by radical Islamist groups. Amnesty International regards these doctors as prisoners of conscience and is calling for their immediate and unconditional release from prison.
