IRAN Faraj Sarkouhi, editor
Isma'il Sarkouhi, brother of Faraj - RELEASED

According to information received by Amnesty International, Isma'il Sarkouhi was released from detention on or around 6 February 1997. His brother, Faraj, is reportedly still detained.

Amnesty International is concerned at reports by the Iranian news agency, IRNA (6 February), alleging that Faraj Sarkouhi has had an extra-marital affair with a female journalist. Adultery by a married man in Iran is, in most cases, a capital offence. Amnesty International fears that Faraj Sarkouhi may face charges of adultery and risks being sentenced to death.

Amnesty International also notes that a letter attributed to Faraj Sarkouhi and published in a German newspaper, (Die Tageszeitung, 31 January) states that he was forced to confess to having an adulterous relationship and to being a spy. Espionage charges in Iran also carry the death penalty.

Amnesty International is unconditionally opposed to the death penalty.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/telexes/faxes/express/airmail letters in French, English or in your own language:

- welcoming the release of Isma'il Sarkouhi and seeking details of his legal status;
- continuing to seek full details of the whereabouts and legal status of Faraj Sarkouhi, including any charges against him and any trial proceedings which may take place;
- calling for the immediate and unconditional release of Faraj Sarkouhi if he is held as a prisoner of conscience;
- urging that Faraj Sarkouhi be humanely treated and granted immediate and regular access to family members and doctors and lawyers of his choice; urging that Faraj Sarkouhi not be sentenced to death.
