# Further Information on UA 34/06 (MDE 13/011/2006, 10 February 2006) and follow-ups (MDE 13/022/2006, 28 February 2006; MDE 13/070/ 2006, 23 June 2006) - <u>Possible incommunicado</u> detention/ Fear of torture and ill-treatment/ Possible prisoner of conscience

#### IRAN Elham Afroutan (f), aged 21, journalist and member of the Writers' Association, Mohsen Dorostkar (m), journalist

The verdicts in the cases of journalists Elham Afroutan and Mohsen Dorostkar were issued by Branch 26 of the Revolutionary Court in Tehran on 4 July 2006. They were arrested in January following the publication of a satirical article in the provincial weekly newspaper *Tammadon-e Hormozgan* (Hormozgan's Civilization), on which they both work.

Elham Afroutan, a journalist at *Tammadon-e Hormozgan,* was reportedly banned for five years from "exercising her social rights" (which includes being banned from working as a journalist), after she was convicted of the charge of "spreading vice." However, she was acquitted of the charge of insulting Ayatollah Khomeini, the founder of the Islamic Revolution. She was also sentenced to one year's imprisonment which was suspended for five years, reportedly on account of her age. According to her lawyer, Elham Afroutan will appeal against her conviction and sentence.

Mohsen Dorostkar, the editor-in-chief of the Tammadon-e Hormozgan newspaper, was reportedly acquitted.

The *Tammadon–e Hormozgan* newspaper was permanently closed down in April 2006 and its licence was revoked by a criminal court in Tehran for "insulting the Islamic Republic's leadership".

## **RECOMMENDED ACTION:** Please send appeals to arrive as quickly as possible, in English, Arabic, Persian or your own language:

- urging the authorities to lift the ban on Elham Afroutan forbidding her from working as journalist as this sentence is solely related to the publication of the article;

pointing out that Amnesty International considered her to be a prisoner of conscience, held solely on account of the peaceful exercise of their internationally recognized right to freedom of expression and as such she should have been released unconditionally;

- reminding the authorities that as a state party to the ICCPR they have undertaken to uphold Article 19 of the covenant which states that everyone has the right to freedom of expression.
