JORDANMahmud Muhammad 'Aswan, aged 38, Egyptian national Kabud Hamdan Raslan Sabir, aged 20, Egyptian national

Mahmud Muhammad 'Aswan and Kabud Hamdan Raslan Sabir, both Egyptian nationals, are feared to be facing imminent execution. Their death sentences for murder, handed down by the Criminal Court on 10 December 1996, are believed to have been recently ratified by the Court of Cassation. Their only hope for clemency now lies with King Hussein bin Talal.

While Amnesty International sympathizes with the families of the victims of violent crimes, it unreservedly opposes the use of the death penalty in all cases as a violation of the fundamental right to life, as enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

FURTHER RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/faxes/express/airmail letters in Arabic, English or your own language:

- urging King Hussein bin Talal to commute the death sentences against Mahmud Muhammad 'Aswan and Kabud Hamdan Raslan Sabir to a more humane form of punishment;
- urging that no more death penalties be carried out in Jordan and that the government work towards abolishing the death penalty by the 50th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1998.
