The execution of a Saudi Arabian national in Riyadh on 10 November 1999, brings the total number of executions this year to 102.

Amnesty International believes that dozens more prisoners may be at risk of imminent execution. Although the organization has asked the authorities for details of over 50 such people it has not received a response.

People are sentenced to death after trials which fall far short of internationally recognized standards, including Article 14 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), which states that "everyone shall be entitled to a fair and public hearing by a competent, independent and impartial tribunal established by law", and resolution 1984/50 adopted by the Economic and Social Council, on the Safeguards guaranteeing the protection of those facing the death penalty.

Prisoners are often tried *in camera* and without legal assistance. Confessions obtained under torture are sometimes admitted in court, despite Saudi Arabia's accession in 1997 to the UN Convention Against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman and Degrading Treatment or Punishment.

This Urgent Action is the last in a series of weekly preventative death penalty actions issued in the past few weeks. Amnesty International would like to thank all those who have taken part.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Crimes punishable by death in Saudi Arabia include drug trafficking, murder, rape, armed robbery and apostasy (turning away from Islam). Of the 102 people executed this year, 53 have been foreign nationals, including 15 Pakistanis, 10 Nigerians (three of them women), nine Afghans, six Indians, as well as nationals of Thailand, Indonesia, the Philippines, Syria, Jordan, Ethiopia, Chad and Yemen.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Please send telegrams/faxes/express/airmail letters in English or your own language:

- expressing dismay at the continued use of the death penalty and calling for an immediate halt to executions and the commutation of all outstanding death sentences:
- expressing concern that executions are carried out after trials which fall short of international standards, and urging the authorities to follow international standards for capital trials;
- calling for details and clarification of the legal position of all those on death row.
